0. Instructions for preparing your paper

0.1. This document

Please save this document and use the outline on the first page to prepare your paper.

Before formatting your paper, remove these instructions by uncommenting the `\end{document}` line that you will find in this document a few lines above this paragraph.

0.2. Manuscript length

Please limit your manuscript to no more than four pages.

0.3. LaTeX formatting

In order to use this template to create a paper in proper CinC style, you will also need to have the CinC LaTeX macros, which can be downloaded from <http://cinc.mit.edu/authkit/> in either .tar.gz or .zip format. These files include instructions on how to use them, together with complete example papers illustrating how to include equations, figures, tables, and references.

0.4. Title

Avoid abbreviations and keep to one or two lines. Remember that the title should be easily understood when cited as a reference in another publication.

0.5. Section numbering

Number your sections as illustrated, *starting with 1*.

0.6. Tables and figures

Tables and figures can fit across both columns if necessary. Captions go above tables, but beneath figures.

0.6.1. Tables

Keep the layout of tables simple. Avoid the use of heavy lines and boxes.

0.6.2. Figures

To make sure that all labels are clearly legible use at least a 9 point font. Use a line thickness of at least 0.5 mm.

0.7. Citations and references

All references should be included in the text in square brackets in their order of appearance, e.g. [1] [1,2] [1–4]. In the reference list use the Vancouver style (see BMJ 1991;302:338–41 or New Engl J Med 1991;324:424–8).

References to Computers in Cardiology proceedings should now include the volume number. For volumes before 1997, set out as for book chapters giving publisher and place of publication, noting that the publisher changed from IEEE Computer Society Press to IEEE in 1995.

There are (at least) two ways to prepare references. We recommend that you use BibTeX if you can, since it automatically numbers your citations and generates a properly sorted reference list in CinC format, complete with a section heading.

If you do not use BibTeX, prepare your list of references following the commented-out examples on the first page of this document.

0.8. Final page

The text on the final page should be arranged so that both columns are approximately the same height. Insert `\balance` anywhere within the first column, and LaTeX will even out the columns automatically.

0.9. End of instructions

All of section 0 should be deleted before you format the final version of your paper.
